Morgan Jolley, a former ALJBS delegate and optical engineer of BAE Systems Inc, spent the first several minutes alone on the importance of education. He himself majored in optics and received a minor in probability mathematics. In his experience, the main factor in securing a position in the engineering world is directly related to the amount of effort put into furthering and completing one's education. Furthermore, due to the diverse nature of engineering, where one can pursue careers from those in aerospace to these in nanotechnology, a strong foundation of knowledge in maths and sciences is integral. The main purpose of becoming an engineer is to fabricate solutions through inventions and ideas, and Jolley emphasizes that these solutions can only be concluded with the prior necessary knowledge of the fundamentals.

Rand Pear, senior VP of Colliers International, added more advice to our prospective minds. In addition to the importance of education, he further expanded by including the importance of education and by including the necessity of experience. Carrying 18 years of experience under his own belt, he stressed this to the point where he discouraged the concept of formulating an independent real-estate business. In fact, he advised the pursuit of employment in a financially strong real-estate company to maintain stability and allow vertical movement. The main factors that can further one's position in real-estate are observation of more experienced mentors, as well as refining the skills of sociability, creativity, and mathematics. Furthermore, Pear included the appeal of the real estate business by clarifying it, which was the unique opportunity to attain hard assets such as various properties.


